For 25 years, the **Undergraduate Practice Opportunities Program (UPOP)** has been one of MIT's most powerful engines for student success – preparing sophomores not just to enter the workplace but to thrive in it. In a world where technical skills alone aren't enough, UPOP provides what students need most: a structured, immersive yearlong experience that turns academic excellence into real-world career readiness.

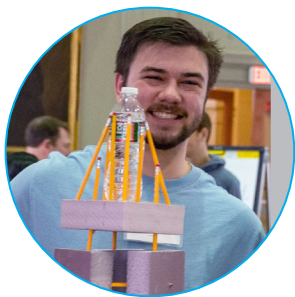
At its core, UPOP equips students with the tools, mindset, and confidence to launch successfully into their professional lives. Through hands-on workshops, individualized coaching, and direct engagement with employers and alumni mentors, participants build the communication, collaboration, and problem-solving skills that set them apart from day one on the job.

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## TRANSLATING TALENT INTO TRAJECTORY

Established in 2001 by the MIT School of Engineering, UPOP was created to ensure that students graduate not only with exceptional technical expertise but also with the professional skills needed to navigate today's fast-changing job market. Since then, thousands of sophomores from across MIT have participated in UPOP's immersive, yearlong programming, which includes:

- Three one-credit professional development courses focused on building the fundamental skills that will help them succeed in looking for and thriving in professional positions.
- One-on-one career coaching and guidance on resumes, interviews, and navigating early career decisions
- Mentorship from MIT alumni, offering practical advice and real-world perspective
- A multiday Team Training Workshop during Independent Activities Period, where students take a deep dive into teamwork, communication, and problem-solving
- Access to a curated employer network, connecting students with internship and job opportunities

As UPOP celebrates its 25th anniversary, we are launching a \$5 million fundraising initiative to ensure the program continues to evolve and expand to meet the needs of the next generation.
